**Richard Hasen** is a nationally recognized expert on elections. The author of several books on voting rights and voting practices, he holds the Schwartz Chair in Law and is also Professor of Political Science at UCLA. His research focuses on the laws and procedures that affect elections, including topics like the weakening of the Voting Rights Act (1965), the introduction of voter ID laws, and the expansion of gerrymandering.

In his Zoomed remarks, he will discuss the many factors likely to impact the 2026 midterms, such as redistricting, changes in election rules, declines in support for Trump, and the possible stationing of troops at polling places.

Professor Hasen holds a B.A., M.A., and Ph.D. in Political Science and a J.D. in Law, all from the University of California.

# The President's Corner

## As your outgoing and incoming President, a Happy Holiday Season to Concerned Citizens, their friends, and families.

Politically, this has been the most disappointing year of my life (and probably yours as well), but Concerned Citizens has not swerved from its commitment to peace, economic and social justice, good government, and a clean environment. Through our meetings, newsletter, action committees, and e-mail blasts, we continue our goal of educating and engaging you in the fight for a fairer, cleaner, more tolerant America.

In these remarks, I will review where we've been and predict where we'll go. What did Concerned Citizens accomplish this year, and who deserves our appreciation? First, a big thank you to our Board members and Committee members. If you serve on any CC committee—Affordable Housing, Budget, Environment, Hospitality, or Program—I thank you for your contributions this past year. Immense gratitude goes as well to Joel Goldstein, technical specialist for all the best clubs in the Village.

**So what happened within Concerned Citizens during 2025?** Administratively, we saw some changes. Micki Nozaki replaced Allan Feldman as vice president, Judy Northrop added Peace Day Chair to her job description (which already included Secretary, Newsletter Editor, Web Mistress, Database Manager, and Archivist). Joining with Micki and past president Diane Bauman, Judy not only coordinated our Peace Day observance but also arranged our Winter Celebration. These three women are our crown jewels! Back in January, Wendy Burry resigned as Program Chair; Allan Feldman and I assumed her duties. More recently, Mary Sinclair resigned as Environment Chair. That position remains vacant. Finally, after six years of service, Hassan Alief resigned as Treasurer. Happily, a long-time member, Robert Cunningham, volunteered to replace Hassan. So that base is covered.

**Now, a few words about our programs.** This has been another very successful year, program-wise. As our engaged audience, you might enjoy hearing what they have to say about you. That's right...they have thoughts about you. How do I know that? Well, mainly because after they've given their talk, I email them a thank you. And they usually reply to my thank you. Here's how some of them replied:

Next year, we have more of the same. A brief rundown of speakers includes, on **Tuesday, January 6, in CH 7, Renée van Vechten on California politics**. She will talk about the laws the California legislature passed to thwart Trump's agenda. That includes laws about immigration enforcement, abortion protection, AI regulation, redistricting, and more. Will these statutes hold up against federal push-back? We'll find out what an expert thinks.

Then on **Thursday, January 15, in CH 1, we will Zoom with Richard Hasen**. A prominent expert on election law, Professor Hasen is in great demand. He will discuss actual and expected changes in election law: redistricting, voter ID laws, and upcoming Supreme Court decisions on campaign finance and the Voting Rights Act. What do these innovations portend for the 2026 midterm? No one is in a better position to predict than Rick Hasen. By the way, both Professors Van Vechten and Hasen have addressed Concerned Citizens in the past, and very successfully, too.

I will not project much further, save to say that in **March, Women's History Month, a former president of the Orange County Chapter of the National Organization for Women will speak**; in **April, Environment Month, Kathleen Treseder, a member of the Irvine City Council, will deliver the Bert Moldow Memorial Lecture**. And sometime in the Summer, our own **Dr. Joel Goldstein will discuss one of the year's most talked-about books: *Science Under Siege* by Michael Mann and Peter Hotez**. Mann is a nationally known climate-change scientist; Hotez is a pediatrician who researches vaccines. Goldstein is known locally as "the man with the camera"!

**Other upcoming events:** in February and March, the Affordable Housing Committee will solicit personal hygiene items for clients of the OC Rapid Response Network, a group of local organizations helping immigrants cope with ICE raids and ICE detentions. Also in March, Concerned Citizens will again participate in the annual Great American Write-In. GAWI is an Orange County event at which over a hundred progressive organizations staff booths to solicit signatures on petitions, cards, and letters urging public leaders to implement policies to make the world a better place.

Finally, **2026 marks Concerned Citizens' 45<sup>th</sup> year**. Forty-five is perhaps a minor rather than a major milestone, but it still deserves recognition. So we'll probably offer something in the way of a celebration. Stay tuned to find out more.

### ***The Plan Within a Plan***





# Affordable Housing and Housing Insecurity

Significant ICE (Immigration and Customs Enforcement) raids and operations continue to occur in Orange County, sparking major community alarm, fear, and protests. As we view the videos taken first-hand by concerned citizens, we see mothers and babies pulled apart, pre-school teachers dragged out of classrooms, innocent protesters pepper-sprayed, and parents so afraid to leave their homes, they are unable to take their children to school or purchase needed food and necessities.

The raids are impacting all of us to one degree or another as we watch this immoral and inhumane campaign play out. Yet, we persevere.

During February and March, we can help families who are targeted by supporting the **Orange County Rapid Response Network (OCRRN)** in donating food and other life necessities to persons and families who are unable to leave their homes.

**Concerned Citizens Committee member Leslie El-Sayad, who is leading the collection drive, spoke recently with Felicity Figueroa from OCRRN to discern exactly how our club could support their efforts. She was told that ongoing and pressing needs include diapers (sizes 5 and 6), toilet paper, and cleaning supplies, including dish soap.**

**Concerned Citizens members can bring donations to our February and March 2026 monthly meetings or drop them off at 68 Calle Aragon, Unit D. Just put them in the beach buggy on the patio.**

OCRRN is an interconnected system of non-profit and grassroots organizations, civil rights attorneys, law school clinics, and individuals working together to respond to dehumanizing immigration enforcement activities and policies in Orange County by documenting and disseminating information to the public about immigration raids and immigration enforcement actions; leading communication education events, training for activists & organizers, and outreach to public officials; supporting and enforcing local policies that advance and defend the rights of immigrants; connecting affected people with attorneys that embrace a participatory defense model of deportation defense; and connecting affected people and families with resources.

# *Yoo Hoo*

In case he is flying below your radar, John Yoo is a professor of law at UC Berkeley and a Fellow of the American Enterprise Institute. During the George W. Bush administration, he wrote an opinion to the effect that executive authority allows “enhanced interrogation” in wartime. This opinion, widely known as The Torture Memo, has been accused of justifying war crimes; we remember its legacy as waterboarding.

Yoo is also a key advocate for a way to govern America called the Unitary Executive Theory. It differs from the “we the people” concept that most of us learned in school. We expect our elected representatives to do just that: represent us and create programs and laws that serve the greater good. We expect the president, as head of the Executive Branch, to faithfully execute the will of Congress.

**The Unitary Executive Theory**, on the other hand, vests sole authority over the federal government in the president. He can fire employees at will, including administrative law judges, prosecutors, inspectors general, and heads of independent commissions. He can employ only those loyal to him. He can ignore the laws and regulations of Congress. He can decide how the programs established by Congress are carried out and can cut off funds to programs that serve his political opponents.

Sounds pretty efficient, doesn’t it? No messing around, no listening to other opinions, no need to be hindered by the rule of law. In this vision, the conservatives’ goal of deconstructing the administrative state is achieved. However, what we have now is not turning into the dream state conservatives envisioned. The proponents of the Unitary Executive Theory were blind to the severe damage it can do to our government. They did not anticipate the heavy hand of the executive on an obedient House and Senate or the crippling control of media, universities, and vital scientific, medical, and legal institutions. If the conservative justices of the Supreme Court should decide against him, he can ignore their orders.

Yoo and other advocates thought only of the advantage that executive control of government would afford their interests: eliminate taxes and remove regulations that curtailed harmful business activities. One question never addressed was: What is government for if it does not meet the needs for which “we the people” created it? What is the point of a government that serves only a wealthy elite, not the public at large? A government that keeps the majority subservient, infringes on civil rights, and proceeds with surveillance, imprisonment, torture, and unauthorized attacks on another country?

Worse yet, what happens when the office of the president is held by an immoral, unethical, self-interested, and mentally unstable man? A man who whimsically declares any activity to be a national emergency in order to unleash more power. We are in the process of finding out, and it is not pretty.

As far as John Yoo is concerned, if I ever should meet him, I would have to ask, “How do you like your Unitary Executive now, John?”

**The Los Angeles Department of Water and Power shut down the last coal plant directly powering California.** It happened 500 miles from L.A., in Millard County, Utah, with so little fanfare that the city hasn't even put out a press release yet.

The lights didn't flicker in Southern California, whatever President Trump might say about the importance of coal to reliable energy supplies. There were no Thanksgiving blackouts. Nobody noticed the difference.

That's possible in part because solar is soaring.

## RECYCLING IS LARGELY A 'TOXIC LIE'

A report published by Greenpeace exposes the plastics industry as "merchants of myth" still peddling the false promise of recycling as a solution to the global pollution crisis, even as the vast bulk of commonly produced plastics remain unrecyclable.

"After decades of meager investments accompanied by misleading claims and a very well-funded industry public relations campaign aimed at persuading people that recycling can make plastic use sustainable, **plastic recycling remains a failed enterprise that is economically and technically unviable and environmentally unjustifiable**," the report begins.

# A Pivotal Opportunity Is at Hand for Action

Throughout the globe, communities are promoting ways to ameliorate climate instability by easing the burden of investing and deploying renewable forms of electricity and by using a variety of means to prepare for the worst consequences. The unintended consequences of burning carbon-rich fuels include drought, firestorms, flooding, storm surges, and erosion. Basically, the power of the wind is one identifiable impact of an overheating planet with warmer oceans. Additional evaporation of water converted into water vapor that traps more heat brings excessive rainfall, snowfall, or precipitation events. We can prepare, or insure ourselves against losses, but eventually, reinsurance corporations will raise the price we have to pay to restore what property the ravages of climate chaos steal from us and future generations. A recent **Science** article suggests financial collapse could be an equally serious consequence of failing to reduce our risks from climate chaos, because expenses grow as pollution reduction is eschewed.


Examples of what is being done widely in countries that acknowledge beneficial actions are instructive. Installing solar thermal (hot water heating) in all new structures built in Israel is one approach. German investments in photovoltaics were enabled because financial agreements allow for roofs to be rented and used for solar-electric generation by corporately financed groups, thereby decreasing a building owner's initial costs.

Other steps include greasing the financial skids, removing obstacles to investments in renewable, climate ameliorating tools. Sweden is pioneering in fostering intercorporate cooperation. "Swedish industrial giants SSAB, LKAB, and Vattenfall are working together to develop fossil-free steel production using hydrogen instead of coal, with plans to license the technology to the broader industry to

maximize impact." Such steps are called resilience since they both reduce pollution and encourage ways to adapt to unseen risks.

**"Under2 Coalition"** is a worldwide movement of subnational governments (states, provinces, regions) committed to reducing heat-trapping gas emissions and limiting global warming, involving agreements and shared policy goals between members like California and Baden-Württemberg, Germany." California alone has agreements with Canada, China, Japan, Denmark, Mexico, and Kenya to electrify transport, better manage scarce water resources, and spread renewable energy sources with battery storage facilities. Leading international uses of technology to mitigate and adapt to abrupt climate change effectively function to reduce or limit human impact through innovative approaches spanning data analytics, engineering, and nature-based solutions. Natural investments include planting forests, restoring wetlands, and engineering green roofs for existing or new buildings.

Stop letting fraudulently misinformed climate deniers strangle your responses to the inexorable damage, destruction, and devastation of global climate chaos. Together, we can effectively inform people that existing techniques, partnerships, and financial means exist and are furthering preventive actions to minimize the worst that nature may hurl at our aging infrastructure. Such steps can save lives, improve health, create meaningful work, and protect property now and for decades to come. We can join the world in confronting abrupt climate change rather than turning away from such good ideas.

## Moving from imagining peace to building peace. . .how do we do that?

Peacebuilding is the heart and soul of the United Nations theme for this year: **Act Now for a Peaceful World**. Through their list of **Sustainable Development Goals**, peace is not just a vision. It's a call to action that each of us can answer by promoting respect, understanding, and justice in our daily lives.

From the UN's site, here are three actions for ensuring a **Just Society**.

### Advocate for quality health care

Add your voice to the global call for universal health coverage and quality care that people can afford. Many civil society groups have taken up these issues—donate to them or volunteer time or skills. Step up for better care in general or find an issue most important to you, like cancer or childhood vaccination. The pandemic showed us: health care, while getting better, still has far to go. Most health systems were unprepared, even as demands for care are growing. Now is the time for public and private health systems to gear up.

### Help reduce mental health stigmas

Many people will experience some kind of mental health concern at some point in their lives. Yet stigma means many of us will suffer in silence. The costs are tragic; every

40 seconds, someone dies of suicide somewhere in the world. If you feel comfortable, be upfront with friends and family members about your own mental health—just like you might with any other health issue. Speak up if you hear discouraging or discriminatory comments, and seek treatment if you need it. Educate yourself to be aware of mental health risks in yourself and those you love—and know what resources you can access for assistance.

### Champion accessibility and inclusion

Promoting an inclusive environment is an essential part of ensuring the rights of every person. Globally, 1.3 billion people, about 16 per cent of the population, have some form of disability—not all of which are obvious or easy to see. Yet, persons with disabilities are often subject to discrimination and exclusion. You can make a difference. Advocate for inclusive and accessible spaces—whether physical or online. And, when you witness any form of discrimination anywhere, speak up.





### Unsure about how to email your elected representatives about issues that matter?

You aren't alone! Lots of people have strong concerns about issues like abortion, fair voting, war and military spending, the environment, humane treatment of migrants, immigration, etc. But they aren't sure what to say—or if their comments make any difference at all.

First, your comments to your elected representatives DO make a difference! According to the League of Women Voters, your representatives look forward to the views of their voters, and emails and phone calls are the best indication of what those voters are thinking. Voters get top priority with most elected officials.

The names above serve ALL of their constituents regardless of their party affiliation! It is important that they hear from us often about our concerns and

our expectations. When you contact the office of a legislator, you only need to write or say a couple sentences about what policy or legislation it is that you are for or against. The staff just wants to know what side of an issue you are on and that is what they record.

If you click on the links above, you will usually come to a prepared email template that makes it easy for you to enter your information and choose the topic you wish to comment on.

#### Here are some email guidelines:

*I am your constituent and I am concerned about [enter your concern]. If it is a specific piece of legislation you are urging them to either vote for or against, enter the bill number, if possible. Briefly explain why you are concerned about the issue or legislation. Don't forget to thank them for listening. And ALWAYS ask for a response.*


